A Word from Father Drummond

As I mentioned in the bulletin last week, when most people hear the words "Latin Mass," they immediately think of the Extraordinary Form of the Mass or the Tridentine Mass not realizing that the normative text of the Novus Ordo, the Mass of Paul VI, is *Latin*. At my previous assignment I celebrated the Mass of Paul VI in Latin every Sunday. One time I had some dissatisfied visitors who on their way out after Mass demanded to know if I had ever heard of Vatican II! When I responded that this was indeed the Mass of Vatican II, they snorted indignantly and left. On another occasion I had for one Sunday changed the Mass schedule so that a newly ordained could offer his first Mass at noon but not have to do it in Latin. Before Mass we had some visitors who asked me if this was the "Latin Mass" and I replied that because of the first Mass being offered we had changed the Mass for that Sunday. Again a disgruntled visitor and who stormed off saying, "We don't *do* the Novus Ordo." "Hmmm," I thought to myself, "that's what you would have had even with the Latin."

In the last month since the Extraordinary Form of the Mass has ceased to be offered at St. Michael's I have had a few expressions of regret (actually about four). As neither Father Brian or myself have been trained in the Extraordinary Form but are both comfortable with the Novus Ordo in Latin, I decided to make the 12:30 Sunday Mass a Novus Ordo Latin Mass, complete with Schola and incense.

Now you may wonder and ask yourself, what exactly are the differences between the Extraordinary Form and the Novus Ordo. A book could be easily written on the topic, and perhaps some have been. I have seen a few articles comparing the two forms of the Mass but sadly they all seem denigrate one or the other rather than being an objective comparison of how they differ. When Pope Benedict first released the *motu proprio* allowing for widespread celebration of the Extraordinary Form, I compared Missals for the two masses and it seemed to me that the Novus Ordo was a streamlined version of the "old" Mass. They are both beautiful but having been trained in and comfortable celebrating the Novus Ordo I decided to stick with it.

If I were to single out one *main* difference, I would say that it is the participation of the Congregation which makes responses that previously were made by those serving the priest at the Altar. In addition the readings from Sacred Scripture are arranged differently. In both forms the Scripture readings follow the Collect, or opening prayer. In the Extraordinary Form there is the *Epistle* (which can in fact be a reading from the Old Testament) followed by the *Gradual* which is either read by the deacon or priest or may be sung by the choir – sometimes antiphonally. The *Gradual* itself is several verses from the Psalms or another Book of the Old Testament. Then the *Alleluia* and then the Gospel. The readings were in Latin which in some places gave rise either to them being read in the vernacular by someone other than the priest or deacon *while* the priest or deacon was reading them in Latin, or to their being reread in the vernacular just before the Homily. At the very end of the Mass *after* the dismissal the opening of the Gospel of John was read (again in Latin). None of the readings were read from the lectern but from the altar – one side for the epistle and the other side for the Gospel.

Another big difference in the Novus Ordo is that we have three readings and a responsorial psalm read in the vernacular from the lectern, during the first part of the Mass: the first reading (usually from the Old Testament), the Psalm, the Epistle, and the Gospel. And only the Gospel has to be read by a deacon or priest. (Here at St. Michael's, we do often make use of the Gradual for the responsorial psalm at our 12:30 Sunday Mass.) There is, however, no Second Gospel after the dismissal in the Novus Ordo.

In the Extraordinary Form there is only one Eucharistic Prayer, the Roman Canon which is very close to Eucharistic Prayer One of the new form (also called the Roman Canon). The new form, the Mass of Paul VI has three additional Eucharistic Prayers. The Second Eucharistic Prayer is taken from one of the oldest liturgical texts we have, being used as early as the second century. In addition in the extraordinary form you can have only one celebrant whereas in the Novus Ordo you can have concelebrants. (In the Chapel of St. Martin at St. Charles Borromeo Seminary, there is an

ambulatory just behind the main altar with about a half dozen small chapels where the priests of the seminary celebrated Mass individually before concelebration was allowed. They were not, however, allowed to all use the same cadence and timing so as to make clear that these were individual masses!

In the Extraordinary Form there is also a distinction between a “Low Mass” and a “Solemn Mass.” The first being read and needing only a priest (and servers) and the second being sung and needing Priest, deacon and subdeacon and with the use of incense. Most Masses before the Mass of Paul VI were Low Masses. In the 1950's permission was given for the Low Mass to be sung and for the use of incense at the Low Mass.

These are just a few of the differences. As I said a book could be written on the subject. This is just a broad overview. I am sure that there are many who will point out omissions and what they see as mistakes that I have made and will be all to happy to let me know. That happens anytime I write on liturgy. And if any find that they are not spiritually nourished here at St. Michael's, I will quite understand if they choose another parish.

The Mass is the center of my life and the reason why I am a Catholic and a Priest. I invite all to come and experience the Latin Mass of Paul VI as we begin on August 19th to celebrate it at the Sunday 12:30 Mass. For many the Latin will be a new experience (and I hope an enriching one), and for others the music will be new, and for some the form may be new. And it will be celebrated as all Masses at St. Michael's are with reverence and love and for the Greater Glory of God.
